NEW GCSE GRADING SYSTEM GRADES 9-1




Changes have taken place to the GCSE grading system.

Here we hope to explain how this change will affect students and what you can parents and carers do to support them.

What has Changed?

- The new system allows for greater differentiation, with nine numerical grades in place of eight letter grades
- The new numbered bands will not translate directly from the old grades A* - G, but we do know that approximately the same proportion of students who currently achieve:
- Grade 9 will be a new grade for very high performing students, to be set as the top fifth of the current A* grades
- Grade 5 will be the benchmark for a 'good pass'
- ▶ The bottom of Grade 1 will be the same as the bottom of grade G



English & Mathematics

Changes in English – Now Liner Exams

- No more Coursework (60 % gone)
- 4 papers totaling 7 hours

Changes in Mathematics – 3 exams not 2

- ▶ 1 non Calculator
- > 2 calculator
- More difficult than current GCSEs we now have some A Level topics at Band 9

How are other subjects effected?

- Science Controlled assessments are no longer part of the syllabus which are currently 25% of the course. The need to learn the mathematical equations has increased as they will no longer be provided (Approx. 20 equations). A book is on sale from science department to support.
- History/ Geography / MFL Controlled assessments are no longer part of the Syllabus.
- Computer Science Controlled assessments are worth 20% compared to now where it is worth 60%

ALL EXAMS ARE NOW MORE DIFFICULT.

What's the Impact on Further Education?

- As it currently stands any child who does not achieve a Band 4 in English or Mathematics will have to re-sit at Post 16 education. However for current Year 10 students the government are considering raising this requirement to a Band 5.
- A Level Requirements Six Band 6-9 qualifications including English & Mathematics.
- BTEC Entry requirements Four Band 5-9 Qualifications Including English
 & Mathematics.

What can you do to assist your child in these difficult times?

- Are you checking 'Show my Homework' and encouraging them to complete it?
- Allocate study time every night.
- Ensure they have the resources to support them in their studies.
- Ensure that they are attending at least 3 afterschool revision sessions per week.

ECDL - European Computer Driving Licence

The ECDL consists of 4 modules:

- Word
- PowerPoint
- Excel
- Combined module

This is currently equivalent to a full GCSE in ICT recognised throughout Europe.

The current plan is all students who are not currently getting a good grade in Computer science will be doing this qualification in the final two weeks of Year 10.
